TRANSFORMATION: Council is focused on ensuring Weinam Creek provides a welcoming experience as well as being an efficient and effective transport hub.

Dear resident,

An important chapter in the transformation of Weinam Creek has begun with Council deciding to take the lead in developing this important waterfront precinct.

Several years ago, in response to Council's request, the State Government declared the site a Priority Development Area (PDA) in order to allow private commercial development on state and Council-owned land at Weinam Creek, Redland Bay, on the condition that a range of community infrastructure was delivered.

From an Expression of Interest process, the Walker Group won the rights to design a plan for a mixed-use development within the PDA. A number of excellent proposals were presented however, due to the relatively small area to be developed, it was deemed that commercial returns would be insufficient to provide the community infrastructure required.

An amicable decision has been reached with all parties for Council to take the lead role in developing the site.

How development progresses is still being formulated but it is most likely to be a mix of Council (or wholly Council-owned Redland Investment Corporation) undertaking some

commercial development along with private enterprise.

The significance of Council being the lead developer is that the area can be planned with a focus on delivering the community infrastructure needed and ensuring the commercial elements which fund the development are sympathetic to the overall outcome of Weinam Creek.

It will ensure Weinam Creek evolves into a precinct that provides a welcoming experience to all as well as being an efficient and effective transport hub for the islands and surrounding communities.

The transformation of Weinam Creek will take years and elements within the plan will be responsive to future needs.

The strategic acquisition of the Moore's Farm land provides the platform for the redevelopment.

This year, the focus will be on work that will expand car parking. It may also include residential development along Moore's Road that will visually screen the carpark from the road frontage and will also generate income to fund infrastructure.

The next development steps are flexible and will be driven by commercial opportunity to fund the overall design.

Parking is the primary issue that needs to be addressed due to the growing islands' population.

A multi-storey carpark at the ferry terminal would provide the primary parking.

Parking will also be provided throughout the PDA, with provision for a second multi-storey carpark.

These parking stations could be sleeved within a building of mixed uses if there is the economic return.





Future on show at driverless shuttle trial

Residents were given a taste of transport options for the future when an EasyMile EZ10 electric driverless shuttle operated in Cleveland recently.

Council is now working with the State Government to host a longer trial.

The autonomous buses have the potential to solve many of the transport challenges we face, with Council interested in how the technology can assist in planning for the city's future transport needs.

There are a range of applications for this technology in the Redlands, from connecting people from carparks to bus, train and ferry stations, transport within events, or even within shopping, health or industrial precincts.

Redland Bay could benefit greatly from these driverless shuttles as a general mode of local transport or improving connectivity to local shopping villages and services.

Driverless technology, such as the EasyMile EZ10, will complement the region's existing transport network while helping Council to deliver innovative and cost-effective solutions to our public transport challenges.

These "smart mobility" solutions are suited to small geographical areas or short runs to and from specific destinations where parking is problematic.

The EZ10 has a capacity of 14 customers, although larger larger vehicles are also available.

They use sensory technology to respond to environmental changes such as pedestrians, cyclists and other vehicles.

The program, which continues in local parks to the end of June, promotes the importance of lifelong involvement in physical activity for improved health and well-being. Apart from the personal health
