The development of culturally aligned and effective programs and services that address the self esteem, self efficacy, leadership and resilience amongst Indigenous youth has been identified as an imperative in building a more robust and culturally safe and encouraging familial, cultural and social environment for Indigenous youth in the Redlands who are increasingly showing signs of engaging in self harming behaviour, disengaging from local schools and becoming estranged from their families and local communities. Enticed by negative and coercive peer groups and social environments, the need for more culturally aligned programs to build a sense of leadership, self esteem, self efficacy and resilience amongst Indigenous youth in the Redlands is of paramount importance. The project will target Indigenous young people aged between 12 and 15 as this is seen as a critical age bracket in addressing this most serious social, cultural and systemic concern.	\$10,000.00
