Aim is to return healthy independent animals back into healthy forest areas. Wildlife carers must be informed about the need of taking care of fodder farms and local forest areas to ensure that the healthy animals that we return have a good healthy source of food thus the need for appropriate equipment and skills in collecting fodder for our animals in care. The correct cutting of trees etc is dependent on the use of the appropriate tools and the maintenance of them.	\$344.60
CS-191-005	Catherine Pruss	Improving the Viability and Consequent Success Rate of Rehabilitation of Native Orphan Possum and Bird Species of Redland City	With the continuous residential and industrial development across the Redlands there has been an increase in the clearing and destruction of the natural environment, with associated busy roads, higher numbers of predators (domestic cats and dogs) and increased human traffic. This loss of specialised habitat and heightened threat of danger often displaces and affects many Redlands' Native Wildlife species. This particular project aims to improve the survival rate of very young, dependent orphan possum and bird species who lose their parents due to the above reasons.	\$1,653.74
CS-191-007	Coochiemudlo Island Bushcare Group	Restoration of the Morwong Beach Bushcare Zones on Coochiemudlo Island through effective weed management	The project aims to restore the Morwong Beach bushcare zones of Coochiemudlo (see attachment A) to a healthy natural state by engaging professionals to undertake effective weed control and to share knowledge by working alongside Bushcare volunteers. In recent years, weeds have out competed native plants in many areas, to the point where Bushcarers need help to successfully maintain these sites. Once expert contractors have eliminated the weeds, Bushcarers can resume maintenance, following advice from the professionals regarding best practice weed control.	\$9,988.00

CS-191-011	Michael Wilson	Redlands Coast Echidna, Possum and Greater Glider Rehabilitation and Release	This project aims to upgrade and purchase vital equipment for the continued rehabilitation and release of Echidnas, Possums and Greater Gliders according to Code of Practice for the care of injured and orphaned wildlife. The project will upgrade degraded equipment from continual use and will build an outdoor enclosure meeting those requirements for the rehabilitation of orphaned and injured wildlife. The project identifies 3 species that have limited resources available to them in this region, one being listed as vulnerable.	\$2,625.20
