Breakwater extension good for Straddie

Cleveland's William Street breakwater is being extended for boating safety. This is good news for boaties and Straddie residents and visitors who may need a medical evacuation by one of our fabulous Volunteer Marine Rescue (VMR) crews.

The work is on track for completion by the end of the year. Jointly funded by Council and the State Government, it will provide protection from extreme weather, including the recreational boat ramps, pontoons as well as the VMR facilities. The next phase is the placement of the armour rock on the core structure.

All going well, the breakwater is expected to be completed by the busy Christmas period, with some finishing touches likely in the New Year.

Division 2 leading the way in sustainability

I know how important waste reduction and recycling are to island residents and I am proud that our Council is leading the way representing your wishes.

We are currently trialling a process that turns plastic bottles and other waste into new, high-quality roads. In a Queensland first, Council has teamed with leading recycler Alex Fraser and Suncoast Asphalt to resurface a 1km stretch of Princess Street, Cleveland, with an innovative, high-performance asphalt product containing reclaimed plastics such as milk bottles. It is hoped the pilot project will lead to many more roads being built and resurfaced using reclaimed materials.

This is very much part of Council's vision for city. The resealing of part of Cleveland's Princess Street used about 933 tonnes of reclaimed asphalt and about 90,000 hard plastics - the equivalent of about nine months of kerbside recycling collected from the street. I thank residents for their patience during the work - they now live on one of the "greenest" sealed streets in Australia as a result.



Point Lookout sewer update

The first stage of the sewer system extension at Point Lookout is underway, with the second stage now in the pre-tender phase.

Residents may see the preliminary stages of work in "Area 1" to connect residents there to the recently completed waste water treatment plant.

In the next few months you will see underground boring and open trench excavation, which has been scheduled outside of peak holiday periods.

The contract for work on the second stage, known as "Area 2", is expected to be awarded soon with

construction planned for February-June next year.

Areas 1 and 2 will be gravity fed to the sewerage treatment plant. Council is continuing to research the best way to sewer the remaining topographically challenging areas of Point Lookout. I will keep you posted on the progress.

TIME TO 'GET READY' AND BE A CHAMPION



Council is keen to activate its award-winning Community Champions program on Straddie, so why not get involved. The program recently earned a Resilient Australia Award for its role in helping Redlands Coast Southern Moreton Bay Island communities help themselves in times of potential emergencies, such as fires.

Through the program, you can provide assistance in evacuation centres during disasters/events such as the recent bushfires, help with community engagement and education and be involved in keeping your community informed. There is also the opportunity to get involved as a volunteer in other parts of the state hit by disasters. Champions undergo training provided by Red Cross in evacuation centre management and psychological first aid. As we all know, summer regularly brings significant weather events and bushfires, so I urge all islanders to ensure they are ready. To ensure you can be best prepared, information for all residents and visitors to Redlands Coast is available at disaster.redland.qld.gov.au

Meanwhile, the Redland Local Disaster Management Group will continue to be vigilant and provide information through Council's website, social media, 612 ABC radio and Bay FM 100.3 radio. Council's news and social media feeds are well worth following to stay up to date with the latest information.

I trust you will find the information here useful.

Prepare your home

- Clean gutters and downpipes
- Secure loose items around your property
- Trim trees around the house (check with Council first), install metal screens and ensure LPG cylinder relief valves point away from the house to minimise fire risk

Make a household emergency plan

- Prepare an emergency kit with essentials such as medications, legal papers, first aid, a battery operated radio, batteries, pet food, money and a torch
- Identify a safe place to evacuate to in a bushfire and decide how you'd look after your pets
- Decide whether to go early or stay and defend in bushfire situations
- Make sure everyone in your household knows the plan
- Have your bushfire survival plan ready.
