

What's happening on the projects front

I am pleased to advise that the following major projects are underway or will start in the coming months, weather and site conditions permitting:

Raby Esplanade Ormiston Stage 2 – This upgrade will include an outdoor ping-pong table, multi-sport half-court with soccer goals, picnic facilities with connecting paths, additional carparking and shade sails over playground equipment.

Apex Park Stage 2 – Construction expected to start in the first half of 2021. It will include relocation of the public amenities, a multi-sport half-court with soccer goal, basketball and netball hoops, an upgrade to the BMX track to provide for different skills levels, picnic facilities and connecting paths.

Liner Street – Work to include new play equipment, including a net climbing unit and double swing to encourage motor skills in a natural setting, along with a table setting, sandstone seating and a new water bubbler.

Plantation Place Park – Work to include a play unit with rope nets, slide, double swing and interaction play panels, along with an upgrade to the bike track to include road safety elements for learner riders. The circular seat under the fig tree and fence barrier will be removed.

Fig Tree Place – Work is proposed to start in the first half of next year on a nature play area to complement the recently installed seat.

Wellington Point Village – Work is proposed to start on the streetscape in the first half of next year. It will include a timber marine post, pelican, Village Park noticeboard, an insect garden boat on the corner of Waterloo Street and additional decking over a planter box.

Wellington Point – a new footpath will be constructed along the western side of Main Road leading to Wellington Point Recreational Reserve early next year to provide visitors and local residents with better access to the reserve.



Keeping our local koalas safe

I am excited about the work being done to look after koalas in our local community.

Ormiston State School students, including the team pictured above, recently planted 114 native plants, including koala food trees, in the school grounds with the help of Council's IndigiScapes team.

With our wildlife corridors so vital to the sustainability of our wildlife, including koalas, I was delighted to see how enthusiastically this next generation "gets it".

Well done to Ormiston State School, a proud Koala Conservation Agreement Program participant!

Following the success of the Koala Safe Neighbourhood program in Ormiston and Wellington Point in 2018, the program is now being expanded into other areas.

Thank you to all residents who have been involved in raising awareness of our urban wildlife. Everyone can assist by becoming custodians of our local koalas and working with us to make sure our iconic koalas are protected for future generations by participating in Council's koala conservation programs and our environmental partnerships and citizen science programs.

All aspects of our enviable lifestyle in Redlands are underpinned by our natural environment. Our natural Redlands ecosystems are reported to be worth \$2.8 billion a year, with Moreton Bay generating another conservative \$9 billion a year, so Redlands is in a unique position to be truly valued for its natural assets. Caring for our environment is just as much an economic choice as an environmental option, so let's work together to "get it right" for our grandchildren and their children.
