Budget continues to deliver on all fronts

I was very proud on 25 June to deliver my fourth budget as Mayor of Redland City.

Our budget for 2015-16 is responsible, sensible and practical and will continue to deliver on all fronts for Redlanders.

Budget time is about balancing the needs of the community with the external cost pressures Council faces in providing the services and projects needed to take our City forward, while at the same time keeping costs down. It is in its ability to meet the needs of the community where the true measure of this budget will be seen. Full budget details can be found at www.redland.qld.gov.au.

In 2015-16, the typical Redlands household – that is a Category 1A owner occupied with a property value of \$280,000 – will see a modest rates rise of 0.5 percent, or about 31 cents a week and significantly less than the average rates increases of our neighbouring councils (Gold Coast average increase 1 percent, Brisbane average 2.5 percent). This is a great result for our community and, while some residents' rates may be impacted by a change in State Government property valuations, this is outside of Council's control and we have done everything in our power to again keep rates increases low for the fourth-straight budget.

We have achieved this modest increase despite facing a 4 percent rise in operating costs, mainly due to a 10 percent hike in State Government-imposed bulk water costs. We have again put people first by absorbing these external costs rather than pass them on to residents in the form of higher rates.

Over the past four budgets, we have handed down cumulative headline rates increases lower than the

cumulative Brisbane Consumer Price Index for the same period. Our rises have consistently been the lowest in South-East Queensland. We have been responsible and responsive by cutting costs and saving millions of dollars though efficiencies – something we will strive to do even more.

This budget also provides the foundations for a strong financial future for the city, predicting a small surplus of \$106,000. This continues our strong financial performance which resulted in the first surplus in more than a decade in 2013-14.

It allows us to continue to deliver great value for money for our ratepayers. The budget responds to our residents' needs and lays the pathway for our journey ahead as a community. It represents Council's commitment to ensuring the Redlands becomes an even better place to live, play and do business.

Redlands leaves lasting impression on Consul-General

Redland City recently hosted People's Republic of China Consul-General Dr Zhao Yongchen – and we left a lasting impression.

In welcoming the Consul-General and his party, I highlighted our City's growing relationship with China, including our sister city relationship with Qinhuangdao. I hope to continue to build on and strengthen our relationship with China through growing development and tourism investment opportunities, education and cultural exchanges.

Dr Zhao said he was committed to growing our relationship with Qinhuangdao, describing it as the start of a journey.



I am pleased Dr Zhao was able to accept my invitation to visit the Redlands so he could see for himself what a beautiful place it is and also its great potential. He and his party had an encounter with a Straddie koala, saw whales and kangaroos and left the island with a lasting impression. Former Capalaba MP Michael Choi was instrumental in organising the visit as an honorary ambassador.

Trade college comes to town


The Australian Industry Trade College (AITC) plans to open its second Queensland campus in Cleveland for the 2016 school year.

The disused research facility once operated by CSIRO at Toondah Harbour will become its temporary home, pending approval from the Non-State School Accreditation Board. The former CSIRO research site - pictured with myself, AITC CEO Mark Hands and AITC Redlands principal Alan Denham - will provide a perfect short-term location for the college, enabling it to identify a suitable permanent site before Walkers requires the land for development as part of the exciting Toondah Harbour PDA project.

This strategic land was bought by Council in 2012 after being used by the CSIRO as a marine research facility for more than 30 years.

Now the land and large commercial buildings will provide a good short-

term solution for the AITC and position it to potentially take advantage of the major \$1.39 billion redevelopment of Toondah Harbour by the Walker Group.



Its curriculum gives young people an alternative means of completing their Queensland Certificate of Education while training full time as an apprentice and providing genuine employment pathways. Positioning the college at Toondah in the short-term will provide an opportunity for aspiring tradespeople to learn from the most important development to occur in our region in a generation.
