SEMP update

Coochie's Shoreline Erosion Study has recently been completed taking in feedback from the community reference group.

The study outlines the environmental, social, cultural and technical considerations to inform the island's Shoreline Erosion Management Plan (SEMP), with the community reference group sharing its observations and experiences in relation to the erosion that has occurred at various locations.

Work is now underway on the development of a draft SEMP, which will specify the preferred approach to coastal erosion management and is expected to be available for public comment by the end of the year.

As chair of the SEMP Community Reference Group, I have sincerely appreciated the time and resources dedicated by individuals and the representatives of various Coochie community groups for their valuable contributions to the SEMP process.

Living on the Edge - a balancing act

Coochie Coastcare has been awarded a Redland City Council conservation grant to develop a publication to create greater awareness of the rights and responsibilities of living in such a special place, surrounded by marine Park and RAMSAR wetlands.

The guide for residents, Living on the Edge, will be developed with Council, State Government and other stakeholders, with the aim to preserve foreshore values and ensure the needs of both marine and terrestrial wildlife are better understood and nurtured.

It will offer information on a range of topics from bush-stone curlews and shorebirds, sustainable fishing and crabbing, the importance of wildlife linkages and healthy bush beaches

A working party will be established to oversee development over the next year of the eight-page information booklet which will be available in hard copy and online for both residents and visitors.

Coochiemudlo Islanders have a proud history of preserving what's unique and the recent Council heritage listing of the Emerald Fringe encircling the island is testament to that community spirit.

This publication will be a welcome resource and will hopefully create better understanding of the reasoning behind local laws relating to compliance issues such as beach fires, camping, vegetation clearance and animal management.
