### Help us to serve you better

In 2017, Council processed more than 4000 customer requests in Division 4 alone.

Typically, these requests relate to issues such as barking and off-leash dogs, illegal dumping, water leaks, tree and vegetation issues, parking issues, road maintenance, development inquiries, rate inquiries, graffiti reports and upgrade requests.

This digital age allows us to connect with people easily.

Personally, I processed more than 1000 customer requests and I would suggest that more than 40 percent of those were lodged through social media.

I am more than happy to receive any inquiry through any medium but it is essential that I am provided with your email address and a contact phone number, as well as an accurate description of the issue, a geographical location (address, area description or Google map) and, if possible, a supporting photograph.

The more information that is provided, the easier it is for our customer service team to provide the required response in an appropriate time frame.

A reference number can also be provided to you with any request and certainly makes it easy to follow up, if required.

#### Museum boost

I was privileged in March to attend the grand opening of the Rotary Heritage Library at the Redlands Museum. Opened by historian and former Capalaba Rotary Club president Col Sutcliffe, the event marked the beginning of the Rotary District 9630 Conference at the Redland Performing Art Centre which hosted more than 1500 Rotarians over three days. The library adds another facet to the already extensive displays, art and exhibits at the museum. It is definitely a must-see for locals and tourists but be sure to allow a few hours.

## Caring for environment

Council is committed to improving our environment and helping wildlife, with almost \$10,000 recently provided in conservation grants.

A major beneficiary has been Victoria Point's Egret Colony Wetlands Bushcare Group to address urban impacts at the wetlands.

It will help the dedicated band of Bushcare volunteers to treat invasive weeds, plant local native species and remove rubbish.

Other grants will go towards outdoor enclosures and equipment to help rehabilitate orphaned, injured and sick possums, as well as rescue and transport injured wildlife.

#### Victoria Point Reserve gets a facelift

In March this year, Council contractors replaced the entire concrete sleeper wall in the lower carpark at the Victoria Point Reserve.

As one the most visited places in our City, it is important that this area be maintained to a high standard.

Your rates fund millions of dollars' worth of infrastructure that requires renewal across our city every year. This particular job was not budgeted for until next year but I requested that it be brought forward as the wall had become quite dilapidated.

# Subdivision deferred

An application for a 270-lot subdivision off Clay Gully Road and Brendan Way, Victoria Point, has been deferred until a Council-led structure plan is completed for the whole emerging community zone between Bunker Road, Double Jump Road, Brendan Way and Clay Gully Road.

This will provide an opportunity to develop a structure plan that guides future growth in the area, including identifying the state infrastructure we need to accommodate this growth.

A Council-led structure plan across the entire development area will address the issues that piecemeal development potentially could fail to deliver.

Many of the roads in and out of the planning area are state roads and Council will also write to the State Government to ask for their input into the structure plan.

Councillors considered that approval of the development at this time would be premature until there was further certainty regarding the likely development of the surrounding area.

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
