

# News from your Local Councillor Cr Paul Gleeson



Redland City's fight against graffiti vandals continues to reap rewards, with a significant reduction in incidents since the VandalTrak reporting system was adopted four years ago.

Council's strategy involving the police and community has become a model for other areas, with quick responses to vandalism and identification of culprits reducing graffiti across the city.

Reported graffiti incidents have fallen from a peak of 294 in November 2013 to an average of less than 60 a month since the implementation of VandalTrak, an online database with mobile app functionality which also has a police interface.

Brought in at the same time as Council centralised its graffiti clean-up effort, Council worked with VandalTrak's creators to customise the system to better suit the Redlands' needs, linking it with contractors and social enterprise groups.

The results speak for themselves, with this initiative saving the community many thousands of dollars.



Importantly, there has been a decrease in the amount of damage done in the past three-and-a-half years and offenders continue to be tracked, charged and either prosecuted or sent to mediation.

Council has partnerships with the Redland Youth Justice Service and Yourtown to clean up graffiti vandalism, and a great relationship with Queensland Police Bayside Property Team, whose members track serial graffiti.

The key to continuing success is for quick reporting, so you can help the fight against graffiti by downloading the VandalTrak app and using it to report graffiti as soon as it appears in our community.

Residents can help reduce issues with hooning by reporting incidents.

Making a report through Policelink, the Hoon Hotline or our local station ensures the extent of the problem is reflected in the police statistics, which can be used to demand extra resources to deal with this issue.

So if you see or hear anti-social behaviour, please make a report to ensure that the statistics are an accurate reflection of local concerns.

#### **Protecting waterways**

Following recent reports of illegal dumping into the City's waterways, please be mindful of what you pour down the stormwater drain.

Sometimes people just don't think of where those contaminants end up when they pour something down the drain.

Residents need to be aware that they end up in our waterways, including Moreton Bay.

Potential prescribed water contaminants include pollutants such as chemicals, oils, fuels, paint, waste water from roof cleaning, concrete or sediment run off.

Recent incidents are being investigated and action will be taken under the Environmental Protection Act where appropriate.

## IndigiScapes heads to next stage

The new propagation sheds at Council's Capalaba IndigiScapes Centre are now completed as the centre moves into the second stage of its development.

This is expected to include refurbishment of the existing centre and construction of new garden spaces, theatrette and better public amenities and administration facilities.

### Road reseal program

A massive amount of road resealing work has been done in Capalaba recently or is on the way.

Work done already includes Mt Cotton Road from School Road to Larbonya Crescent and sections of Loraine and Rickey streets, Estaway Court, Beenwerrin Crescent, Kingfisher Place, Larbonya and Myora crescents, Fern and Pinewood streets and Persimmon, Redwood and St Peters courts.

Work on Almara Street, Aramac Court and Holland Crescent should be done by the time this newsletter arrives, with Allambee Crescent to follow.
