Aquatic Paradise West renewal

The beautiful park at the end of Commodore Drive will get a playground upgrade and new picnic benches, above, for families to enjoy the vista in the coming months. The Moreton Bay figs in the area are coming of age and the place is a popular spot for visitors and residents alike.

Thorneside foreshore

After five years of calling for funding to proceed with the Queens Esplanade foreshore management plan, emergency works were conducted to manage erosion as a temporary solution.

I can assure residents that what you see is not the final solution. I have seen plans from engineers and requested that issues raised in community consultation be incorporated into the management plan for the area to ensure amenity, environment and practical considerations are addressed.

Alma safe as houses

After several years of uncertainty over the original application for 12 units on the 3020m² Alma Street site and many submissions by residents, an application was approved for eight units in 2016.

However local developers have responded to market and community concerns by choosing to proceed with five house lots on this sloping side site. Thank you to Councillors, officers, locals, submitters, owners, organisers and local developers for your involvement. It has resulted in a sensitive response to land-use planning in this prestigious area and is a welcome development.



Mooroondu sportsgrounds

Over several decades, the many fabulous members of our Mooroondu Sport and Recreation Club and relevant committees (football, netball and cricket) have all worked with volunteers and community groups to manage and develop the grounds.

In rainy periods, the overland flow creates some challenges, so I have asked officers to consider mapping and managing a process to ensure long-term planning can be integrated with strategic objectives.
