### **Budget boost for Straddie**

Council's 2017-18 budget provides a boost for North Stradbroke Island's tourism credentials, with \$672,000 allocated for the Gorge Walk Trailhead project and \$300,000 set aside for the renewal of Point Lookout's Wail Rock Stairs, among a host of other projects.

This budget includes funding for much-needed facilities such as showers and taps at Deadmans Beach, Cylinder Headland and South Gorge, as well as upgrades at Cylinder Beach and Adder Rock.

Importantly, it also addresses the needs of the local community by including \$268,600 for work at Dunwich's Ron Stark Oval, as well as funding for seawall projects at Amity Point and Dunwich.

Funds also have been secured to seal gravel roads on the island, along with \$2.7 million for sewer and wastewater treatment projects at Point Lookout.

on offer. I was privileged to be at the opening ceremony of what is becoming a cultural drawcard for our city.

I am particularly looking forward to this year's Kunjiel (Corroboree), which will light up Dunwich on the weekend of 23-24 September with a celebration of dance, music, art, culture and ceremony.

It will feature performances by Black Arm Band, Roger Knox & Band, Adam James Band, Joe Geia and Quandamooka spokenword artists, along with a few surprise guests.

# Still time to have a say on tackling shoreline erosion

Residents still have an opportunity to provide on the management of coastal erosion.

Two community engagement events, supported by displays, have already been part of a City-wide campaign to identify erosion issues across the City's 220km of foreshores.

As part of Council's Coastal Adaptation Strategy, islanders have been asked what's most important to them about where they live and spend their leisure time, and what they want to see preserved the most.

The first engagement on Straddie was on Saturday June 3 at Point Lookout, with about 50 people stopping to give their views or taking surveys to fill in later. Another 70 people shared their thoughts at a second engagement at Cylinder Beach a fortnight later.

You can still be involved by telling us about the changes you've seen, and what you want to see preserved.

Council has provided an interactive map online which shows erosion hotspots and provides details of what planning, monitoring and work is underway to manage coastal erosion in each area.

To see this or join the discussion on coastal erosion, go to 'Your Say' at **redland.qld.gov.au/yoursay.** 

The site allows users to add photographs, pinpoint areas of erosion which may not have been identified and leave comments.

### Memorial a lasting tribute

The 70th anniversary of the Netherlands East Indies Dakota aviation tragedy was marked at Point Lookout with the unveiling of a permanent memorial plaque which will stand as a poignant reminder of the lives lost.

It was fitting that Council funded the Quandamooka Yoolooburrabee Aboriginal Corporation to install the stone which was sourced from the local quarry and put in place by a Straddie contractor.

Flight Sargeant David Bell from the RAAF Scuba Club, who requested the park naming, was instrumental in sourcing the appropriate stone for the memorial plaque. The Netherlands East Indies aircraft was just 23 minutes into its flight from Archerfield on 26 February 1947 when it crashed into waters off North Stradbroke Island, claiming the lives of all six men on board.

Surviving family members of the men and representatives from RAAF, Redland City Council, QYAC and the community were among those who gathered at the unveiling.

I was pleased to be able to support the request to name the former road reserve as NEI Dakota Memorial Park following consultation with the community.



## Signs of the time

Imagine iconic public art entry signs on Straddie - something tourists would snap selfies with, that would engage and attract visitors and celebrate the area's people, place and culture.

This is Council's vision for a signage project as part of Straddie's economic transition strategy, and we are working with the State Government and other stakeholders to make it happen.
