## Sharing views about City Plan

Thorneside and Birkdale residents united to express their views about the proposed rezoning of two Council environmental conservation properties and learned how to engage in the process of making a submission to properly share their opinions with Council officers as part of the draft Redland City Plan consultation, which ends on 27 November.

The Fisher Road, Thorneside, and Quarry Road, Birkdale, properties were proposed for rezoning to low-density housing and residents wished to express their views.

For many residents this was the first time they had met their neighbours and most were pleased to have found a reason to connect with other local people.

Thanks to community members for assisting in raising awareness and expressing interest in coming together to learn about local events.
