Toondah Harbour project progresses

The formal endorsement of plans to revitalise Toondah Harbour takes us to the next step in this \$1.3 billion project – community engagement on the detailed plan and critical environmental impact and development assessments.

This is a massive project. I am keen to see the Walker Group's response to the technical and environmental challenges that a project of this size is likely to meet. It is important to the Redlands that it delivers on its mission to revitalise the local tourism industry by delivering a world-

class ferry terminal and amenity improvements for local residents.

The need to fix Toondah's parking issues and terminal is urgent. I recently met with Deputy Premier Jackie trad and told her that I was concerned about the possible delays and difficulties inherent in such a large project.

Council will now work with the State Government and the preferred developer to formalise a development agreement and move forward on detailed project plans. Residents will get a further say on the design when the developer lodges its environmental impact assessment and development application and I urge all interested residents to get involved.

The Walker Group will now start preparing its environmental and planning applications, as well as seeking Federal Government approval.

The environmental impact assessment will inform the detailed design of the project, which could be available mid next year.

Raby Bay trial

The trial of a new method of repairing retaining walls will proceed at Raby Bay this financial year. During this \$100,000 trial, grout will be injected into selected retaining walls along the canals that are showing signs of movement or damage. The repairs will be monitored to determine the viability of this method.

Field upgrade

Redlands sporting clubs will enjoy more games under lights at Henry Ziegenfusz Reserve with lights to be installed on Field 3 this financial year. More than \$320,000 will be invested in this project, which includes a power upgrade.

Pool project

Council has earmarked \$1 million to upgrade filtration systems, pipework and pumps at Cleveland Aquatic Centre this financial year. The project will improve water quality at the centre, which attracts 200,000 visitors a year.

City park blooms

Youngsters should love the colourful new play sculpture in the revitalised Bloomfield Park in the heart of Cleveland. The new park, heavily influenced by community feedback, promises to be a people-friendly showpiece and just as popular with families as the old version. It's also wi-fi enabled.
