Bushfire risk means we must be prepared

Dear Resident,

As you can see from this map the latest forecasting by the Public Safety Business Agency, prepared in conjunction with Council and the Queensland Fire and Rescue Service - Mt Cotton, Sheldon and parts of Redland Bay face a very serious bushfire threat this summer.

While I sincerely hope that it will never eventuate, a major fire would have a huge impact on this division as the Queensland Fire and Rescue Service has defined West Mt Cotton and parts of Sheldon and Redland Bay as "undefendable".

While all agencies will provide a highly professional response to fires in the areas, they may not be able to control them in all circumstances.


This makes it extremely important for people to have a plan and to educate their children on what to do and when to evacuate.

I stress that while Council is working to reduce fuel loads on publicly managed land and maintaining fire breaks, especially around highly populated communities, this needs a "whole of community" response. A lightning strike can cause a potentially life-threatening fire, so wherever you live the need for preparation cannot be overstated.

Residents now have their own tailor-made emergency plans to help them plan for such an eventuality.

It is available free online as an interactive website. I urge all residents to access it. It explains in detail what residents need to know to ensure the safety of themselves, their family and neighbours.

Sheldon has now been added to Mt Cotton and Redland Bay as high risk fire ant areas, so I urge all Division 6 residents to be on the lookout for these pests. Besides giving a nasty bite, these imported South American ants also present a serious social, economic and environmental threat.

While the State Government is responsible for the program to halt the spread of fire ants, the vigilance of all residents and businesses is essential if we are to make inroads.
