#### **Better roads**

In an effort to save money, Council voted last year to communicate with residents through a quarterly magazine. As many residents reported they did not receive the information, we have decided to resume our divisional newsletters.

In July 2013, I was one of the councillors who voted for a reasonable and fair Budget (with an average rate increase

throughout the City of 1.43 per cent) which delivered an accelerated road maintenance budget of \$20 million. As a consequence, a number of roads in Division 9 have had long-overdue upgrades.

Some of these now include School Road (pictured above), Elmhurst Street, Pittwin Road South, Jasen Street and Jute Court.

### Mobile microchipping

Council offers a great mobile microchipping service for pets, such as our family's pooch Misty.

Officers will visit pet owners at home for \$25 and people can pay on the spot using mobile Eftpos.

It means people can be responsible and microchip their animals without having to leave home.

It also means much-loved pets such as Misty can easily be tracked if they go missing.

## Graffiti improvements

On 1 July last year, Council started using the VandalTrak App to report graffiti.

At the same time, arrangements were made with social enterprise groups to remove and/or paint over illegal tags.

Since then, hundreds of cases of graffiti (covering about 400m²) have been reported in Capalaba alone, totalling over 550 man-hours of removal at a cost of over \$9000.

We are now really seeing the benefits as the vandalism is occurring much less frequently.

## **Holland Crescent precinct**

I have been addressing hooning and aesthetic issues around the Holland Crescent area with Council officers.

In May/June of this year, the first step will take place with a number of traffic islands being installed.

Once these have been fitted, I will be addressing the aesthetics and livability of the precinct with other departments within Council.

#### Rhodes of a different type

I continue working towards a better result for the Rhodes development site on Mt Cotton Road.

The proponents of the former project went into administration last year and I can confirm that after extensive lobbying of other councillors, Redland City Council

entered the tendering process to buy the site.

The intention was to find a better use of the block than a six-pack of sixstory buildings.

Unfortunately, we were out-bid and the site has been acquired by new owners.

While the previous development approval has now expired, potentially the new owners could seek an extension in the courts.

I hope that a better solution can be found and I look forward to working with the new owners towards a better outcome for all those affected.

**Rotary Club of Capalaba:** \$1000 to assist with the Rotary Vocational & Police Officer of the Year Awards presentation


**Capalaba District Meals on Wheels:** \$2640 to help buy a new steam cleaner/scrubber for the kitchen floors
