Dog owners are reminded that their pets must be securely contained or kept on a leash when out of the yard.

There have been a number of concerning incidents of late with dogs being allowed to roam. Our local law requires owners to ensure that when the animal is in a public place it is kept under effective control, which is defined as including a person who is physically able to control the dog by a leash or chain. Failure to have the animal under effective control may result in a fine. Since January, Council's animal management officers have issued more than 140 infringement notices for offences such as failing to ensure an animal in a public place is kept under effective control.

Coochie boost

The Coochiemudlo Island Foreshore Park upgrades have been focusing on areas between, and adjacent to, the existing barge ramp and ferry jetty. Future works will likely include significant upgrades to the existing playground, Pioneer Park and adjoining picnic areas, as well as new pedestrian footpaths. The Curlew Creek rehabilitation is part of this project.

The draft landscape plan is now open for comment. We are also planning to hold an "open house" event to provide local residents with further opportunity to have their say.

Collaborative effort restores a shoreline





When a storm surge from ex-Tropical Cyclone Oswald hit Coochiemudlo Island in January, 2013 destroying almost a kilometre of beach and infrastructure it galvanised community action and spurred a valuable partnership.

With Commonwealth funds, SEQ Catchments and Wetland Care Australia joined forces with Redland City Council and Coochiemudlo Island Coastcare to restore the Ramsar-listed Melaleuca Wetland shoreline and historic Norfolk Beach, the 1799 landing site of Mathew Flinders.

Weeks of sand-scraping, 6000 dune plants, hundreds of volunteer hours and re-inforced walkways now covered in sand have returned a valued public amenity to the Redlands and greater southeast Queensland.

Budget comment

The process of developing and adopting Council's 2014/15 budget was complex.

Through a process of 18 workshops, Councillors' input was provided on each and every aspect of the budget and our votes on each issue are recorded in the minutes. Please feel free to contact me at any time if you would like more information on this process.

On a positive note, the headline rate increase of 3.48 percent is the lowest of any South East Queensland council and we are still working on delivering more efficiencies this financial year.

When you drive back into the Redlands from Brisbane or Logan, I believe you can see and "feel" the qualities that


make our City the best place to live in southeast Queensland.
