# Massive upgrade for Judy Holt sports fields

The major upgrade of the car parking facilities at Judy Holt Recreation Reserve in Birkdale, pictured, is well under way and expected to be completed before the end of the year, weather permitting.

The \$1.5 million project jointly funded by Council and the Australian Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) extension program will greatly improve access and safety.

The carpark, which services a number of sports and events, will be expanded by about 60 more spaces, the existing parking area upgraded and lighting added.

The highly anticipated lighting will result in a safer, more formalised parking facility for this busy community area.

A formalised pedestrian crossing point will also ensure safe access between the cricket fields and carparks.

This is a tremendous result for all of Redlands Coast as the Judy Holt Reserve sporting complex hosts 1000-plus visitors each week.

The project would see the fiveyear master plan for the area brought forward and completed. The clubs associated with the reserve provide exceptional support to our community, including the Muddies Cricket Club, Redlands Dog Obedience Club. Redlands Darts Association, Redlands Orchid Society and the Redlands Multi Sports Club, which regularly hosts community groups such as the Waterloo Bay Stamp Club, Eastern Suburbs Bridge Club, Fun Stars from the Fun Farm Disability Group, Wildlife Preservation Society, Redlands Fishing Club and the Business Networking Group, along with dance clubs and the Ulysses Motorcycle Club.

# New lighting for Valantine Road park

Council is significantly upgrading the pathway lighting in Alexandra Hills' Valantine Road Park.

The \$375,000 project, also funded under the Australian Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) extension program, will boost safety in this popular green space.

It is anticipated these much-needed new lights should be in use by Christmas.

The previous lights in the park were solar, which were among the first installed in the city more than 20 years ago and quite outdated and difficult to maintain.

The new lights are far more efficient and provide added security for residents who walk through this area at night.

# **Community safety a priority**

Redland City Council has an active working relationship with Queensland Police to help deal with issues which affect our lifestyle, such as anti-social behaviour and crime.

A clear message to come from Queensland Police is that it is important residents report state policing issues directly to the Queensland Police Service as this is the quickest way to get action and also help police to get a picture of where resources need to be directed.

So if you see or hear anti-social behaviour, you need to make a report to police.

If there is an immediate threat to your safety always call 000 if you require police, ambulance or fire crew to attend immediately. This applies to when a crime is in progress, someone is seriously injured, a life is threatened or the offender is still in the area.

Non-urgent reports relating to hooning and antisocial behaviour can be made through the Policelink service, either online at police.qld.gov.au or by calling 131 444. You also can call the dedicated hoon hotline on 13HOON (134 666).

Please provide as much information as you can about the incident, including the time and date, location, nature of the incident and, when it comes to hooning, details of all cars involved, including registration plate details if possible.

Hooning is defined as any of the following: speeding and street racing; 'donuts' and burn-outs; screeching brakes; revving of engines; skidding, drifting and fishtailing; and driving so as to cause unnecessary noise or smoke.

All of this behaviour can be dangerous and the culprits risk having their vehicles impounded. By reporting incidents, you will help police to identify and target hotspots and help make the roads safer for everyone.

Non-urgent police matters, such as a break and enter, property damage and vehicle or property theft, can be reported to police online via the Queensland Police Service website, by phoning Policelink on 131 444 (24 hours, 7 days). You can also call Crimestoppers on 1800 333 000 if you have information about a crime.

Non-police matters can be reported to Council for action on 3829 8999. These include issues such as graffiti and vandalism of Council property (which can be reported via Vandaltrak mobile app), illegal dumping and littering, abandoned vehicles and shopping trolleys, animal-related complaints, potholes and faulty street lights.

### George Street path a welcome addition



been fulfilled with the installation of a pedestrian and bike path to provide a safe route through Alexandra Hills' George Street Park. The concrete path, which connects George and William streets, was funded through Council's Community Infrastructure Program and is something that many residents have asked for, connecting the dog off-leash area and play equipment in the middle of this beautiful tree-lined and leafy space. Council is also planning to improve the George Street entry.



Birkdale's active transport network will soon receive an upgrade that underscores Council's commitment to encouraging walking and cycling safely across Redland Coast.

The Birkdale Active Pathway Upgrade, which is partly funded by the Queensland Government, involves extending the existing shared pathway at the Judy Holt Recreation Reserve to the Tarradarrapin Creek Wetlands in the north and Allenby Road in the south.

This 2km shared pathway will offer wonderful benefits to the community and visitors and demonstrates how Council is prioritising walking and cycling opportunities as outlined in the 2020 Redlands Coast Transport Strategy.

The project also forms part of the Queensland Government's Principal Cycle Network Plan and will connect to the future Northern Greenway Active Transport Corridor.

The pathway route has been assessed by engineers and designers to ensure active commuters have a safe and easy connection through Birkdale and along the natural Tarradarrapin Creek Wetlands environment.

This work is expected to be delivered concurrently with the upgrade of the Judy Holt Recreation Reserve carpark.

The Birkdale Active Pathway Upgrade is supported by the Queensland Government's Cycle Network Local Government Grants Program.

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
