How our garden has grown!

Many locals came together in October to celebrate the long-awaited opening of the Redlands Coast Salad Bowl Community Garden and to sign up for membership of the garden group.

The community garden in Fielding Park, Redland Bay, has been built by volunteers, with donations and support from local businesses and Council.

The garden features many elements that reflect the farming history of southern Redland Coast, with families descended from the original farmers who settled the area donating funds and display items.

Hundreds of locals turned out to enjoy the new community space, which provided an opportunity to view the large farm history display, while enjoying an afternoon tea donated by local businesses Supa IGA Mount Cotton and Crusty Edge Bakery.

A management committee is being formed to set a calendar of fun and interesting events, with members able to garden in their own allocated plot at the garden, or garden at home while enjoying talks and opportunities to join with like-minded gardeners for social connection.

The garden was officially opened by Mayor Karen Williams and myself and we helped to plant the first tomato plants in the raised garden. The new community space was blessed by local resident Shemaine, who performed a traditional smoking ceremony on behalf of the Quandamooka traditional owners.

The attendees heard from volunteers of Community Connections and project



managers Craig Wilson and Craig Luxton about their experience in conceiving of and building the garden. Betty Goleby dedicated the arbour, which was constructed with donations from her family, to the memory of her husband John and his brother Ernie, who were both local farmers. Mrs Goleby revealed that the Goleby farm was the supplier of gladiolus for performer Barry Humphries, with the farm sending the famous flowers all over Australia and direct to London for his alter ego Dame Edna Everage.

Eastern Escarpment a regional recreation destination

It is great to see the upgraded Redlands Coast Eastern Escarpment Conservation Area already being enjoyed by cyclists, bushwalkers, horse riders and nature lovers.

The major upgrade to this naturally wonderful 187ha area, bought by Council in 2008, has long been on Council's to-do list and was able to be brought forward as a result of the Queensland Government's COVID Works for Queensland funding.

It has made this area even more enticing to visitors while also helping to protect the region's biodiversity.

It was wonderful to meet rising mountain biking (MTB) star, 16-year-old Bailey Meares, and adaptive mountain biker (aMTB) Renee Junga at the recent media event. I am sure the track will inspire more future Olympians, with the popularity of the area greatly increasing since word got out about the new trails and facilities.

About 7km of trails have been upgraded and more than 13km of new trails created with new wayfinding signage, along with new viewing opportunities out to Moreton Bay. New trailhead facilities at Gate 2 (near Schoek Road) include a small sealed carpark, amenities, potable water and a shelter with signage incorporating a map.

As well as providing an improved experience for recreational users, the upgraded trails also provide better access for the effective management of weeds and fires in the reserve.

They have proved yet again to be exceptional at what they do, with Redland City State Emergency Service Unit volunteers scoring a state award and six regional awards during the recent SES Week, which acknowledges the outstanding service SES volunteers provide to their own and other communities during times of crisis.

Local Alex Johnson, of the Redland Bay SES Group, deserves a huge pat on the back after being named not only the Brisbane Region Volunteer of the Year for his distinguished service but also the Queensland Volunteer of the year. Alex was recognised for his leadership, dedicated service to the community and for continually developing the knowledge and skill level of fellow members, providing the service with longevity.

The Redland City SES Unit was also highly commended.

In the past 12 months or so, the unit's members attended 490 jobs, from land searches for missing people, responding to storm damage, supporting police

Book a fire hazard inspection

Council, in partnership with Queensland Fire and Emergency Services (QFES) and the Rural Fire Service (RFS), is working across the city to carry out audits to help identify overgrown vegetation and anything that can increase fire hazard risks.

Officers from Council's Bushfire Hazard Reduction Team and QFES/RFS have been carrying out an audit program in Mount Cotton, visiting individual properties.

As well as encouraging households to check and maintain their property to ensure it does not have overgrown vegetation or a build-up of fuel load, the Bushfire Hazard Reduction Team and QFES/RFS will provide practical advice and direction on reducing fire risks.

Anita Street pedestrian bridge update

The replacement of Redland Bay's Anita Street pedestrian bridge is expected to be completed around Christmas, weather and site conditions permitting.

I thank residents for their patience as the work to demolish and rebuild this vital link over Moogurrapum Creek, which connects the eastern end of Anita Street with the Pinelands Circuit Park and on to North Street, has progressed.

I know many residents have missed it since it had to be closed due to structural concerns, with its total replacement considered the best option.

Council was able to access the second phase of the Australian Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) program to fund the project.
