The most effective way to manage graffiti is to remove it as quickly as possible, preferably within 24 hours. Rapid removal limits the admiration a vandal receives from their peers, which is often their primary motive. It also reduces the likelihood that the area will attract further vandalism.

The roads improvement program not only ensures a smoother drive for Redlanders, but also shores up the infrastructure foundations for our future.

Everyone hates potholes, so it has been my pleasure to serve you as Infrastructure spokesman and help address your key concerns of roads and road safety. I am particularly pleased that 30 of the 109 roads scheduled for

resurfacing in 2013-14 financial year are in Division 7.
