Koala visit brings plenty of smiles

Sheldon residents recently received an early Christmas gift with a koala and her joey (pictured) spotted in Summit Drive.

It caused quite a bit of excitement when the sighting was posted on the local Facebook page and was also a reminder of the value of signing up to Redlands Coast Koala Watch. This joint partnership between the community, koala researchers and Redland City Council allows you to contribute to local koala conservation by reporting your koala sightings.

The information you collect and record is used by researchers and Council to boost koala conservation, help sick and injured koalas and improve local koala mapping.

To get involved, go to Council's website and search "Redlands Coast Koala Watch".

If you do spot a koala and it looks sick or injured, you can get help from our local wildlife rescue service by calling 3833 4031.

The Redlands After-hours Wildlife Ambulance (RAWA) and Redlands Wildlife Care Network (RWCN) are operated by teams of dedicated locals who give up their time to rescue sick, injured and orphaned native wildlife across the city every day and night of the year. PCYC supporting our community

Well done to Capalaba's PCYC Redlands for supporting local women and families affected by family and domestic violence through its RUBY program.

RUBY (Rise Up, Be Yourself) is a free weekly physical fitness program for women who are, have been or likely to be experiencing domestic and family violence.

Supported by Council, It helps participants build fitness in a safe environment while boosting their general well-being, self-esteem and confidence.

It also allows participants to connect with other women and assistance, with sessions facilitated by a qualified, female personal trainer. A female police officer also participates.

Helping community

Capalaba Rotary Club has benefited in recent years from Council's grants program, which has provided opportunities for the club to work with Council and Councillors in partnership on projects and events.

In addition, Redland City Council grants and Capalaba Rotary Club funds have conduced an annual Vocational Service and Police Officer of the Year Awards evening. Capalaba Rotarians have also mentored and supported Wellington Point, Birkdale and Capalaba Probus clubs in successfully applying for grants to provide

Local history rediscovered

A chance discovery by a Redland City Council biosecurity officer has generated quite some excitement among local history buffs.

While monitoring weeds in an area to the west of Avalon Road at Sheldon in March, he came across what appeared to be an old log crossing on the upper reaches of Tingalpa Creek.

It led to an expedition by Council Local History team members who made their way through thick bush and vines and past massive trees following GPS co-ordinates recorded by the officer.

After trekking for an hour-and-a-half, they discovered what was most likely an old timber-cutters crossing from the 1880s, with logs almost 3m long laid parallel to each other across Upper Tingalpa Creek.

Loggers were among the early pioneers of the area and Avalon Road was known as Sawmill Road for almost a century, with a mill established on Wallaby Creek in 1876. Some of the timber from the area was used in the construction of the penal colony at St Helena Island in Moreton Bay.

The Local History Team is keen to find out more information about logging in the area, including how they moved the logs out of this rugged terrain. If you can add to our knowledge, please let me know at adelia. berridge@redland.qld.gov.au

Southern Thornlands update

An amendment to City Plan which will effectively prioritise economic development and employment in the Southern Thornlands Potential Future Growth Area (STPFGA) remains with the State Government for review.

In January Council resolved to proceed with a major amendment to City Plan which would allow the area to be used for mixed industry and business, education, training

and recreation, a transport precinct, storage and larger home-based industry enterprise activities. Council's view is that land not used for economic uses should only be used for larger rural living blocks, reducing pressure on transport while protecting the area's relaxed rural lifestyle.

The proposed amendment was then submitted to the Minister for Local Government and Planning for consideration as part of the State Interest Review. Currently, the amendment is paused pending a request for further information. Council officers have discussed the request for information with officers from the State Government, which at the time of writing was currently considering its response.
