Ambassador koala making tracks

Tracking of ambassador koalas in the Ormiston and Wellington Point areas has led to some interesting results recently.

Seven of our 10 local ambassador koalas are actively being tracked as part of Council's program with one, a young female, surprising everyone with a major move during the recent dispersal season away from her previous home range around Raby Esplanade Park.

Guinevere (pictured) has chosen a lifestyle that keeps our koala team members on the edge of their seats, not only crossing the rail line at Cleveland, near the station, but also moving across Shore Street West and through the Black Swamp area before hanging out in the big eucalyptus trees along Smith Street outside Cleveland

District State School. Thankfully, after weeks of making her way along busy roads, crossing rail lines and through yards, it seems at least for now she has settled. It shows the risks koalas take when looking for a new home. It is a reminder of the value of signing up to Redlands Coast Koala Watch to help keep an eye on our koalas. This joint partnership between the community, koala researchers and Council allows you to contribute to local koala conservation by reporting your sightings.


The information you collect and record is used by researchers and Council to boost koala conservation, help sick and injured koalas and improve local koala mapping. To get involved, go to Council's website and search "Redlands Coast Koala Watch".




Supporting local benefits us all

Planning concerns

Ormiston/Wellington Point are suburbs that have and are facing changes due to development.

Being along the train line, areas were zoned for medium density residential planning schemes prior to 2006. Changes made to this zoning in the 2018 City Plan increased the density in those particular areas and others across the City.

I always advocated for the Medium Density Design Code to also be included in the City Plan to ensure developments were designed for best outcomes and consider the liveability of our suburbs. This amendment to the City Plan is presently with the Minister for Local Government and Planning to be signed off. I have followed up as these improvements cannot proceed without the State's approval.

If a development application complies with the City Plan, there are no planning grounds to request changes – this is the power of the City Plan and illustrates why I continually stress the need to have the City Plan represent "Redlands community values".

If you have any questions regarding planning please send me an email as I am happy to discuss this important aspect of Council. One enormous City project presently being considered is Toondah Harbour, so please have your view included and make a submission. Esplanade embankment works

I continue to advocate for work to start rehabilitating the landslips at Wellington Point. Council has engaged a consulting engineering firm to recommend the best way to rehabilitate the embankment in front of the road on the Esplanade, Wellington Point. The area was affected by a land slip during a severe rainfall event in February. As a result the esplanade track between Main Road and the eastern side of Wellington Point Recreation Reserve remains closed.

As advised by signage at the site, there is evidence of asbestos in the embankment relating to historical filling that occurred many years ago. Given the difficult nature of the work, a timeframe for its completion has yet to be determined.

Council understands that the esplanade track in this area is enjoyed by many in the community and is seeking to minimise disruption. The consultant has advised that the risk to private property of further land slippage is low.

The track will remain closed until the investigations are complete and Council appreciates the community's ongoing patience. Wellington Point Recreation Reserve can still be accessed via Main Road. I will keep the community up-to-date with progress.
