Hi

I have recently met with the mountain bike riders and expressed the concerns of council in regard to trail maintenance and liability issues, however they have a question which I did not have the answer to, as per the email below, can someone please explain how we have trail maintenance groups set up in other parks and why they are allowed to continue when others are not?

Further, apparently in Western Australia they have a three tiered system for trail maintenance where the simplest task such as superficial raking or rocks and leaf litter off the trail would be a level three activity where as corrections to camber or tasks requiring digging or bringing in of materials would be a level one activity. Then the clubs are 'approved' to carry out level three activities only, or level two activities under council supervision through special approval and the council only performs level one activities.

This seems censible, has this been looked at as a model we might adopt for mountain bike track maintenance. The riders argue that they must clear the debris (rake) for safety, but technically cannot do so in our parks?

Thank you for taking the time to write and raise these concerns. I am aware of the need for maintenance on the Eastern Escarpment trails and I am awaiting information from the relevant department managers on what they are doing to get this addressed as soon as possible.

You are correct, there are keen volunteers who want to help, unfortunately han having trouble getting agreement from the department to allow that, as you have noted, because of liability concerns. This has been extremely frustrating for riders, the clubs and myself, but we continue to try to press for a combined maintenance regime which includes the department carrying out the major maintenance requirements and the volunteers being able to do the minor work. To add insult to injury these same people seem to be engaging with and freely allowing trailcare to be performed at the Redlands Track Park and Bayview Conservation Area. Whilst both important assets and trail centres in our region, Eastern Escarpment is the true crown jewel attracting riders to travel from Brisbane, Gold Coast and Toowoomba, bringing money into our local economy

We can state that the MCRA has the volunteers, financial and physical resources ready to go to get the program going. We got the support of an experienced Trailcare Coordinator that RCC recommended to run the program but we were then still denied the application. This all just begs the question, why?



# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

This scope document is to present the Mt Cotton Riders Alliance Inc.'s plan for the sustainable maintenance of the Redlands City Council's mountain biking trail network within the Eastern Escarpment Conservation Area (EECA).

It will present general principles of trail maintenance and applying them to the unique context of the EECA with a key aim of the document to promote healthy working relationships between the Redlands City Council, Mt Cotton Riders Alliance Inc., trail care volunteers and event organisers to ensure trails remain fitter purpose through a sustainable and environmentally considered maintenance program.

It comes in response to the growing popularity of the trails and increased facilitation of successful mountain biking events in the area, including the Rocky Trail Fox SuperFlow® and Rocky Trail Academy Schools Comp. Data collected from Rocky Trail Entertainment indicated that the recent Fox Superflow® had a total number of 763 attendees of with an estimated economic value of \$154-\$196K for the Reclands City Council area, please refer to Appendix A for further details.

The Eastern Escarpment Conservation Area is a 186ha reserve located in Mount Cotton that forms the upper catchment of Eprapah Creek. It incorporates multi use fire roads and single trail. The reserve climbs steeply from the valley floor up the north-east side of Mount Cotton to 360-degree views of the South East Queensland region at the very top. Terrain is rugged and includes deep gullies and dry eucalypt forest with some remnant riparian vegetation and patches of rainforest<sup>3</sup>.

As identified in the Eastern Escarpment Conservation Area Plan, Rail maintenance not only protects the asset and ensures a quality recreation experience it also mitigates any risk exposure. To be seen to have a regular maintenance program is a key part of risk management<sup>4</sup>

In reviewing this scope document, we also draw Redlands City Council stakeholder attention to the economic benefits that can be derived from volunteering, with an estimated \$3,214 per volunteer, per annum, as identified in the AusCycling commissioned study into Mountain Biking in Australia: An Economic and Participation Analysis<sup>5</sup>. This analysis also highlights the significant social benefits of mountain biking to the community, equating to \$3,722 per rider, per annum.

The Mt Cotton Riders Alliance Inc. Verys the adequate maintenance of the EECA trail network to be a key factor in the Redlands City Council realising the benefits highlighted above. To ensure the network is sustainably maintained and provides for a positive trail user experience will contribute to the longevity of the EECA as a vital asset to the Redlands City Council and the local community.

As the Mt Cotton Riders Alliance Inc. already possess the funds to establish a volunteer led trail maintenance program for minor works, providing further material benefit the Redlands City Council and allowing for future budgetary considerations directed to major works.

We welcome the opportunity to discuss the scope document in more detail and look forward to working with the RCC on this exciting opportunity.

TRAIL MAINTENANCE SCOPE DOCUMENT

# STRUCTURE

It is proposed that the structure of the trail maintenance program be conducted under the establishment of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Redlands City Council (RCC) and the Mt Cotton Riders Alliance Inc. (MCRA).

It is recommended this be based on common practice Trail Adoption Agreements such as those provided in the Western Australian Mountain Bike Management Guidelines<sup>6</sup>, to be agreed by both parties prior to the commencement of trail maintenance.

A Trail Care Coordinator (TCC) shall be appointed, by either the RCC or MCRA with two assistant Coordinators supporting this role and appointed by the MCRA. The TCC shall be responsible for all communication between the RCC and MCRA Trail Care Volunteer Group.

#### FUNDING

Initial funding for the procurement of hand tools and equipment will be provided through an existing \$3,500 in allocated MCRA funds. This shall also fund trail maintenance days the providing food and drinks for volunteers.

Ongoing funding for volunteer conducted maintenance of the trails will be sourced from MCRA fundraising activities, which may include however not limited to the following:

- Club membership fees
- Merchandise, for example, club apparel
- Events fees on event run by the MCRA
- Requesting event organisers to donate a percentage of each entry fee to trail maintenance.
- Raffles and crowdfunding
- Trail adoption/sponsorship by local pusinesses.

Functing for major works shall be sourced from a combination of RCC ongoing budgets, functaising and grant applications by the MCRA and other community groups and event organisers in the lead up to and following events, such as Rock Trail Entertainment's annual donation following the conduct of the Fox SuperFlow<sup>®</sup>.

#### TRAIL ASSESSMENT

Trail maintenance involves implementing methodologies to ensure continued trail predictability, ride quality, trail sustainability and reducing environmental impact.

Any decision to perform work on a trail shall be made on balance. Mountain bike trails are unique in that they occupy a point between the built and the natural environments. Any decision to work on a trail should be made in balance against preserving elements of desirable "trail character".

Elements of trail character develop over time through the interaction of bikes with the natural environment. The following elements shall be considered when assessing the trails.

# TRAIL USERS

ther than mountain bikers, as defined in AusCycling's Australian Mountain Bike Trail Guidelines:

- Adaptive Mountain Bikers encompasses a broad range of events and riders who typically cannot ride a standard mountain bike and require adapted equipment and trails to suit their physical, intellectual, neurological and sensory abilities.
- **Hikers** more focused on setting and destination, most mobile users, capable of cross-country travel.
- Horse Riders less affected by tread condition, prefer loops, greatly prefer water access, require longer distances than hikers for a valued experience.
- **Trail Runners** most similar in movement to mountain bikers (speed, distance, preferred.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL

Environmental considerations are extremely important in deciding on which construction techniques are employed during maintenance.

The ecological value of the flora and fauna present, the identification of threatened species or larger trees are examples of environmental considerations which greatly inform the guidelines around how the trails in an area are maintained.

The Geological stability of the landscape, the soil types and how prone the soil is to weathering and erosion is another important consideration in the management plan for an area.

An example of environmental context informing trail maintenance guidelines would be in areas where spread of phytophthora dieback is a concern. As dieback spreads via the transportation of loose muddy soil, the prevention or rectification of puddling will be a high priority. Maintenance programs will have a heavy focus on trail armouring and trail profiling to maintain a well-draining trail tread. In areas where the spread of dieback is less of a concern, then a maintenance program with less focus on controlled water management, in favour of retaining elements of matural trail character may be more appropriate

MCRA recommends that as part of the establishment of the trail maintenance program a walk through with RCC environmental officers be conducted to retentify areas of environmental concerns and to assist in the education of environmental considerations specific to the EECA.

### TECHNICAL DIFFICULTY (GRADE)

All EECA trail technical difficulties are graded and sign posted, with the grade being based upon the technical features present and the exposure to risk. At all times trails shall be assessed in accordance with their originally constructed Trail Difficulty Rating System.

The MCRA recognises the work conducted by AusCycling in their recent publication

Australian Mountain Bike Trail Guidelines, and suggest the adoption of these guidelines given their adoption of the International Mountain Bike Associations Difficulty Rating System<sup>7</sup>, with the follow additions and amendments following:

- The addition of two new trail difficulty classifications one new classification between green and blue and one new classification between blue and black
- Making the following difficulty assessment criteria 'guiding criteria only':
  - o Trail width
  - Trail surface
    - Trail gradient
    - Quality of signs

Making the following difficulty
 assessment criteria 'risk assessable
 criteria':

- Trail exposure
- Natural and technical trail features.

At all times this difficulty rating system shall be used for assessing trail conditions and their maintenance, in accordance with their originally constructed grading.

#### TRAIL TYPES

A trail type is a description of both the technical specification of the trail, likely rider experience and mountain bike discipline the trail was constructed in accordance with.

The EECA is assessed as having a mixture of the following trail types:

- Cross Country (XC)
- Flow (FL)
- All Mountain (AM)
- Gravity/Enduro (GE)
- Downhill (DH)
- Adaptive

Refer to Appendix B for the Trail Difficulty Rating Matrix.

# INSPECTION AND REPORTING

Trails will be subject to varying weather conditions, wear and tear and potentially vandalism, which may create hazards to trail users. Hazards on the trail should be recorded under an asset management system and highrisk hazards should be eliminated as soon as discovered.

During trail auditing hazards should be rated, using the risk rating system outlined shown in Appendix C. This can be done by carrying out a risk assessment on each hazard as it arises. Should the hazard be deemed high risk measures should be taken to prevent injury. This may take the form of temporary trail closure, or in some circumstances warning signage and bunting may suffice.

Communication protocols shall be outlined in the MOU and the reporting party should let all other relevant parties know of any trail closures or hazards. Temporary signage at trail access points, social media posts and email updates to stakeholders are all methods of communication that should be considered if there is a need to close the trail for maintenance. Hazard reporting should be consistent, and all data should be retained for future reference. Hazard reporting should be conducted using an agreed format and maintenance inspections should be carried out at the agreed intervals, and by the agreed parties, with a proposed template provided under Appendix D Trail Assessment Form.

# TRAIL INSPECTION

### PROGRAM

While the inspection program aims to prevent the need for major maintenance works, it is important to ensure that ad hoc maintenance activities are undertaken from time to time as required. The trail inspection will detail any issues that require maintenance, such as:

- Trail surface issues
- Drainage problems
- Vegetation regrowth on the trail
- Condition of signage
- Condition of technical trail features (TTFs)

Refer to Appendix D Trail Assessment Form, Appendix E for a list and description of common trail condition issues.

# TRAIL MAINTENANCE

The trails will be maintained in accordance with the sections proceeding and in the manner, outlined in the follow sections.

At all times the MCRA and RCC shall adopt collaborative and construction communication to ensure the effective continuation of trail maintenance and the safe enjoyment of trails by all users.

# FREQUENCY

Frequency of trail maintenance depends on factors such as the amount and type of use, soil type, vegetation type and where the trail is located. Extreme weather events may necessitate unscheduled maintenance and hazard checks. Appendix G, Trail Maintenance Inspection Schedule provides an indicative schedule for general maintenance conducted on a monthly basis with guidance taken from the Eastern Escarpment Conservation Area Plan to inform the schedule.

MCRA shall also conduct ad hoc maintenance as required through hazard identification and pre and post events being conducted on the network. RCC shall be notified through agreed communication means of any ad hoc maintenance being conducted.

# STANDARDS

All trail work must adhere to the AusCycling Australian Mountain Bike Trail Guidelines specifications and dimensions.

Trails and TVFs shall be maintained to the original classification, as per the documented trail design. When undertaking maintenance works, the following standards should be adhered to:

- No material, apart from drainage clearing, is moved without prior approval by the RCC.
- No material from outside the EECA area to be brought into the area without prior approval by the RCC.
- Trail surface should be maintained to the original classification.
- Visitor risk management processes should be in accordance with RCC requirements. Such as trail closures, signage and notification of works.
- Drainage should be maintained to minimise the pooling of water or erosion on or adjacent to the trail.

#### SIGNS OF TYPICAL WEAR

Trails typically change over time with use. Trail surface change is acceptable provided:

 The original trail classification is maintained. This means the trail dimensions, corridor clearance, specifications and features on the trail remain within the required standard. Refer to Appendix B for the Trail Difficulty Rating Matrix and AusCycling Australian Mountain Bike Trail Guidelines

- No environmental issues have been caused, such as erosion, track creep, excessive pruning/damage to vegetation.
- All trail technical features are of sound construction.
- Standing water is not settling on the trail surface.

#### ACTIVITIES

Refer to Appendix F for Trail Inspection and Maintenance Schedule which outlines things to look for and frequency of inspection/maintenance required.

#### **WORK DEFINITIONS**

**MINOR WORKS -** Minor works are those which can be performed by hand using small nonpowered hand tools. These include but are not limited to, shovels, rakes, secateurs and water pump packs.

MINOR WORKS FOR APPROVAL - Minor works requiring the RCC approval include:

- Those which require powered tools or machinery.
- Trail head and orientation signage modifications and installation.

**NEW WORK** – Work that modifies the frail surface alignment, TTFs of drainage features beyond the original dimensions and specifications.

All new works will require RCC approval and supervision, the community should be notified of all trail closures.

# ACCESS

MCRA will require access by 4WD vehicle in order to transport equipment and volunteers to areas of trail maintenance.

All verticle transport shall be restricted to designated fire roads, with hazard lights employed and restricted to a maximum speed of ten kilometres an hour.



Further to below email and our recent phone discussion, as promised please find below an update in regards to Council officers position in regards the issue of Trailcare:

- There is a view that supporting a Trailcare model, even if by a permit based approach, will require additional resourcing.
- This is based on a view that this will be an expansion of service for those teams impacted in managing a Trailcare arrangement and also the further expansion that is anticipated into other locations under Parkcare arrangements.
- Officers are looking to prepare a report to Council to coincide with the upcoming budget process to deal with the matters relevant to Trailcare and Parkcare arrangements, including options to manage including via local law permits or alternatively by a volunteer management coordinator and associated resourcing.
- There is a desire to see a proactive approach to developing the proposed options and officers are currently advancing:
  - The establishment a six-month pilot permit for MCRA to help gauge appropriateness and success.
  - Continued benchmarking with other ocal sovernments to form a more informed report to Council, which will include recommendations and a more precise view on resourcing, costs and a preferred operating model.
- Coordination and management of the project is currently best placed within Parks & Conservation.
- Enforcement of compliance with the permit conditions is best positioned within Environment & Regulation.
- Noted risks are: managing a trailcare arrangement will be resource intensive; and work will be necessary to identify the most appropriate locations for Trailcare activities.

Council officers will continue to progress the above in early 2024 and provide updates to you in regards the proposed pilot permit for MCRA. Hope this information assists in the interim to your enquiry. Thanks.



Dear Cr Talty and Cr Mitchell

I write to you this evening a frustrated and tired of the situation of the trail care programs in the Redlands.

Cr Talty as you may recall I wrote to in March 2022 after the unprecedented rain events that had a large impact across the region. At that time we had trailcare coordinators and our club volunteers who had to sit on their hands and not assist in the clearing and repair of the trail network.

The council officers made a commitment to solve this issue and despite my mails to the officers, we are in a situation that is no better today than what it was 2 years ago.

Since that time whilst some small trailcare events have occurred informally by the dedicated trailcare coordinators, they and the formal and regular volunteer trailcare activities have been forgotten or ignored. Instead the model of using contractors with machines have been brought in at great expense to council that clearly is an unsustainable model.

More frustrating is that I have heard through my friends at Mt Cotton Riders Alliance that there is a new trailcare manager in Redlands Council and there has been no reach out to the largest mountain bike club in Queensland. What is promising is that MCRA and the new Redlands Trailcare coordinator are meeting and that we hope that a volunteer trailcare model will be implemented to minimise the amount of contractor spend needed to sustain the trails.

Whilst our interests include Eastern Escarpment, the club is equally concerned for Scribbly Gum and Bayview trailcare.

To my knowledge there has been no contact to the existing Trailcare Coordinators and the opportunity to get in to the forest to ensure the drainage points designed in to the trails are clear so that water can move in to the vegetation and soak in rather than flow down the trails and create damage that will need to be rectified. This could have been completed since the events at Christmas time and given the pending weather this weekend it could have reduced the risk of further damage.

As a club our members have been actively involved with the Logan City Trailcare Alliance - Cornubia. They have kept those trails open for most days since the weather events at Christmas. The trailcare coordinators live right next to the trails, they inspect the trails on foot after significant events and provide a direct update (usually with photos) to the council representative. They clear trails of debris where it is small and safe to do so, and they close off tracks if there are serious risks (overhead hanging branches). This is the same model that we used to use here in the Redlands and one that has been replicated with QPWS at Bunyaville, Brisbane Forest Park and Daisy Hill. This model was developed by RATS members nearly 20 years ago and is still effective today.

Even more important formal volunteer trailcare groups are an opportunity to amplify messages in particular when trails are closed. The RATS are not communicated to to help communicate to our 700odd members and the broader MTB network through our social media channels. As there is no contact with the current trailcare coordinators none of the "Closed Park" messages have been amplified.

Right now we are not concerned what model is used. We believe that as the largest MTB club in Queensland who contributes so much to the economic, social and sustainable fabric of the local Redlands community through our volunteers, our participation programs and our events (local to international events in 2024) that we need and want to be involved with trailcare at all parks across the Redlands Council area. In addition when significant weather events, we have the expertise and resources to safely enter into the parks when closed to itemise critical issues and where safe to do so fix the trail networks for all park users including mountain bikers, runners, horse riders and pedestrians.

Can you please advise what is needed to get a solution that is permanent and financially sustainable?

### **The Risks**

- The public use of tracks/trails where they traverse privately owned land, raises risks for Council:
  - Legal proceedings against Council personatinity and property damage (landowner, public user and Council).

  - Where the public is "invited" to use them (publication of trail maps, signage etc.) there will be higher risk and liability for Council.



The Council is satisfied that, pursuant to section 254J(3) of the *Local Government Regulation 2012*, the information to be received, discussed or considered in relation to this agenda, item is:

(h) negotiations relating to the taking of land by the local government under the Acquisition of Land Act 1967.

### PURPOSE

To seek a resolution to acquire land for the purpose of formalising tenure for public tracks and trails that cross over privately owned properties.

### BACKGROUND

Council currently manages many kilometres of tracks and trails used by the public for various recreational purposes. Council publishes maps (on the swebsite and through other forms of media) of publicly owned conservation and recreational areas, depicting tracks and trails to encourage community use of the network.

In most cases the tracks and trails pass through land either Council-owned in freehold or controlled by Council as trustee. However, there are instances where the alignment of the trail and/or the surrounding maintenance buffer encroach onto private land.

A review of the tracks and trails that cross over privately owned land indicate they are at least 20 years old, based on information available on historical aerial photos. Many of these trails are historical tracks used by previous landowners, energy providers, loggers and the like.

As boundary markers are largely non existent in some locations, the public continues to use them as a result of this legacy.

The tracks and trails are also used by:

- Council's operational teachs for maintenance and fire management activities, as well as using them to link to other adjoining Council land.
- Other extended parties (such as Queensland Police Service for 4WD training and other organisers for cycling or walking events) through more formal permits.

As such, it is pecessary for Council to regularise the use of these tracks and trails by ensuring they are provided with tenure to allow ongoing public access.

Some of these encroachments have relied on a history of 'status quo acceptance' by the owners, having been used by the public for many years. In other areas, ownership of the underlying land has changed, and the new owners are not as willing to continue accepting the unlawful access.

**ISSUES**All tracks are well established and due to the topography and/or conservation values of the surrounding land, moving the alignment of the track onto Council land is impractical and/or cost prohibitive.

The increased activity and use by the public in recent years and Council's active management of the tracks has increased risk to Council (liability and reputational). Signage, promotion through various media and coordination of large events on the trails network, has effectively 'invited' the public to access private land. In some case, an interim lease/licence arrangement has been established, but ultimately Council owning the land (or enduring rights to access) will provide the best mitigation of that risk.

The tracks and trails operate through a range of Council property assets, but no one area of Council has overall responsibility. Therefore, a program and associated budget to resolve the encroachments had not previously been established.

Strategic Property, in consultation with relevant stakeholders, submitted a budget review to allocate funds for land to be acquired to provide a permanent solution. This would ensure the tracks and trails can continue operating, without exposing Council to legal and/or reputational risk.

Following approval of budget in the recent budget review process, the process to acquire land (refer Attachment 1) can commence. The first step will be to seek to acquire the land with the owner's agreement through a private sale process. However, if this is not achievable, land may be taken under the provisions of the Acquisition of Land Act 1967 (the Act).

Owners are also entitled to claim compensation for the land being taken, including the fair market value and disturbance costs associated with the taking of the land, such as their reasonable legal fees and valuation costs.

### STRATEGIC IMPLICATIONS

**Legislative Requirements**Schedule 1 of the Act allows Council to take land for any purpose, including for those relating to transportation, environment and recreation.

**Risk Management**The current status of 'inviting' the public and other users onto private land exposes Council to both legal and reputational risk. The increased activity by all users also increases the risk of personal injury or property damage occurring on private land. Acquisition of the land will provide a permanent solution to the continued use by the public of the tracks and trails and for Council to complete maintenance and other asset management activities.

**Financial**Council resolved to adopt the revised budget for 2024-2025 at its General Meeting on 18 December 2024. This included estimated valuation costs associated with acquiring the land.

Subject: Encroachment of Council tracks/trails on private land

### SUMMARY

To confirm a property acquisition strategy for mitigating liability risk related to sections of Council's public tracks and trails on privately owned land and constructed footpaths and assets on unallocated state land.

### ISSUES

Council currently manages many kilometres of tracks and trails and pathways on public open space used by the public for various recreational purposes. Council publishes maps (on its website and through other forms of media) of the surrounding conservation or recreational area and the track/trail path.

The tracks, trails and footpaths are also used by:

- Council's operational teams for maintenance and fire management activities as well as using them to link to other adjoining Council land.
- Other external parties (such as Queensland Police Service for 4WD training and other organisers for cycling or walking events ) through more formal permits.
- The general public

In most cases, these assets pass through land either Council-owned in freehold or controlled by Council as trustee. However, there are instances where the alignment of the trail and/or the surrounding maintenance buffer encroach onto private land and unallocated state land. In some cases, these legacy tracks/trails have relied on a history of "status quo acceptance" by the owners, having been used by the public for many years. In other areas, ownership of the underlying land has changed, and the new owners are not as willing to continue accepting the illegal access.

The State (represented by the Department of resources) have also issued an encroachment notice on Council in relation to footpaths and other assets on unallocated State land (see attachment 2).

Irrespective of the owners' position, Council is legally exposed by inviting the public and others to use the track or trail. This liability risk to Council has escalated in recent years due to increased frequency and greater volume of public using them.

The risk on a few of these properties has been temporarily mitigated through short-term licence agreements. Others have no existing mitigation measures in place.

### briefing note



Although these tracks and trails operate on a range of Council assets, no one area of Council has overall responsibility and therefore a program and associated budget to resolve the encreachments have not previously been established.

Strategic Property has consulted mainly with COSAM (as the majority asset owner of the underlying land) and Parks and Conservation (as operations managers) to develop a long-term solution for consideration. Other service areas consulted through this process have included Legal, Communities, Community Engagement and various areas within Environment and Begulation.

### **ACTION REQUIRED**

Further work needs to be completed in refining the options analysis and confirming cost estimates. However, subject to approval of this strategy, a capital submission will be prepared and submitted, either as part of the 24/25 prioritisation review and/or for 23/24 capital budget review. Additional operational funding will also be targeted (24/25) for the due diligence and formal processing of each acquisition. Source of funding will be determined through the refining process.

As an ongoing financial commitment, Parks and Cons have provided a maintenance estimate for the addition of the above land parcels - \$31,000 per annum.

Although t is used that all owners will welcome this initiative, some acquisitions may require a formal resumption pathway. Technically a Council resolution is not required for this purpose and value, however, as there are several properties involved across multiple divisional areas, a Councillor Briefing will be scheduled.

### Unallocated state land (USL)

Budget has not been calculated to resolve tenure of USL but approximate costs for survey plans and obtaining retrospective evidence of reclamation of the land is estimated or be in the range of \$15,000.00 to 35,000.00.

### Recommendation

It is recommended that approval is granted to progress this property acquisition strategy initially through the next Portfolio Board meeting for consideration.

The Adventure Trail concept project

- Early in 2024, Council commenced Stage One of the project and engaged:
  - World Trails to develop a concept plan
  - BDO to undertake a preliminary feasibility study.
- Approach has been to identify and use existing tracks and trails that are fit for purpose, to minimise the initial capital cost and allow for expedient project delivery.
- As part of the Operational Budget 2024-2025 Council resolved for \$75,000 to be included, to partly fund Stage Two of the project (detailed design and feasibility), pending progression past Stage One.

### **Project: Stage One**


- Council has received drafts, and provided feedback on both the concept plan and preliminary feasibility.
- Council expects to receive final copies of the reports in coming week/s.
- It was planned that the final reports would be brought to a future Council Workshop including consultant presentations, for Council's consideration and direction on progressing to Stage Two.
- Both Stage One draft reports indicate the project is worth proceeding to Stage Two level of investigation and analysis.

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### Stage One: high level concept

- Examined four existing trail networks Bayview Conservation Park, Cornubia Forest Park, Daisy Hill Conservation Park and Eastern Escarpment Conservation Area – and the opportunity to connect these with a shared-use 'adventure' circuit trail, total distance of approximately 35kms.
- The trail will need to cross several significant roads. Safe road crossing options required significant further investigation and design works.
- High-level cost estimate to construct all the infrastructure elements is \$567,000. This does not include contingency, road crossing treatments, shelters or toilets.
- The effective management and upkeep of the trail will require having a regular inspection and maintenance program in place, which also needs to be costed as part of Stage Two.



# Stage One: Preliminary feasibility

- This report examines: Purpose, Opportunity, Market Demand, Financial and Funding Considerations, Commercial Opportunities and Implementation Considerations
- · Identified several positive characteristics and potential benefits including :
  - Adventure tourism sector, and particularly the mountain biking and hiking segments, has grown rapidly since the COVID-19 pandemic
  - > Limited availability of high-quality adventure trail products and experiences in SEQ
  - > Diversification and growth of the region's tourism offerings
  - > Infrastructure required is limited, building on existing local assets.
  - Opportunities include leasing of Council land adjacent to the Trails for commercial purposes, licence fees for the provision of exclusive use.
  - Clear strategic alignment with key priorities of both Redland City and Logan City Council's related to economic growth, prioritisation of tourism and optimisation of the region's natural landscapes.

### **Project: Stage Two**

Stage two investigations have been estimated at \$150,000, in addition to staff project management and input resourcing.

- There are a number of parcels of land that require negotiations with land owners/land managers. These will need to be investigated/resolved between the land owner/manager and Council, prior to Stage Two work proceeding.
- Resolving these issues early is recommended, as these sections have the potential to derail the project if not resolved.
- Depending on the outcomes of the Trail Detailed Design, Cultural Heritage and Ecological investigations may/may not be required.

### Redland CITY COUNCIL

### **Project: Stage Two**

- Thorough on-ground research to identify the most suitable route, associated trait construction treatments or infrastructure required for the trail to be constructed.
- Trailhead Review: examine where the proposed trail passes through each of the four existing MTB trail networks.
- Trail Network Review: identify any opportunities and locations for potential new trails, to identify any trails requiring upgrades or improvements, and to outline priorities for ongoing investment and maintenance.
- Signage: identify locations for trail information and wayfinding signs, and development of a signage plan.
- Consultation with other specialist consultants: work with relevant authorities and traffic engineers to identify options and costs for each crossing.
- Cost estimates: Establish a Bill of Quantities and provide an estimation of probable cost. Explore various construction and staging options. Identify increased, ongoing maintenance costs.
- Further examination around the realisation of potential commercial opportunities.

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# Stage Two Funding opportunity

- The State Government has a \$750,000 pilot funding program to support trail development across QLD, and Redlands/Logan has been identified as recipient of that funding to fund 50% of the Stage Two detailed design and feasibility.
- Indications from department staff is that the relevant Minster and local member are keen to make an announcement regarding this funding in coming weeks, and would like to do so in collaboration with Council, Logan City Council and community stakeholders.
- Given the potential timing of this funding appouncement, noting Council has not viewed final reports, staff are looking for direction from Council on how they wish to proceed.
- It is not anticipated the \$75,000 is at risk if Council is not ready to commit to Stage Two today, rather benefit in ensuring a clear partnered approach with the state government and clear communication with stakeholder groups and the broader community.

- Council advise the Department of Tourism and Sport that Council is not in a position to enter a funding agreement nor participate in a funding announcement until final reports of Stage One have been formally considered.
- Council communicate with key stakeholders regarding progress of the project.
- The final reports from Stage One be presented to a future workshop along with proposed project and funding plan for Stage Two.
